Introduction

Business travel is experiencing a structural shift unlike anything in recent memory. Rising traveler expectations, increased operational complexity, and heightened financial scrutiny are creating new pressures across the ecosystem. At the same time, corporate travel programs and TMCs are being asked to deliver a more intuitive experience with fewer resources, while hotels confront unprecedented cost pressures and the growing importance of loyalty, merchandising accuracy, and channel profitability.

These converging forces framed the two industry roundtables DerbySoft hosted in London and Denver. In both sessions, leaders from hotel brands, TMCs, fintech innovators, distribution partners, and corporate program owners offered candid, unfiltered perspectives. Despite their varied roles, the message was remarkably consistent: modernizing business travel is now impossible without modernizing the underlying connectivity and data flows that support it.

The industry has attempted to build incremental improvements on top of legacy structures, but those foundations can no longer carry the expectations placed on them. This paper re-frames the operating model required for business travel to scale, automate, and meet the modern traveler where they are today. It is grounded in the insight shared at both roundtables and shaped by the industry's collective desire for greater accuracy, consistency, and collaboration.



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Key Shifts Reshaping Business Travel

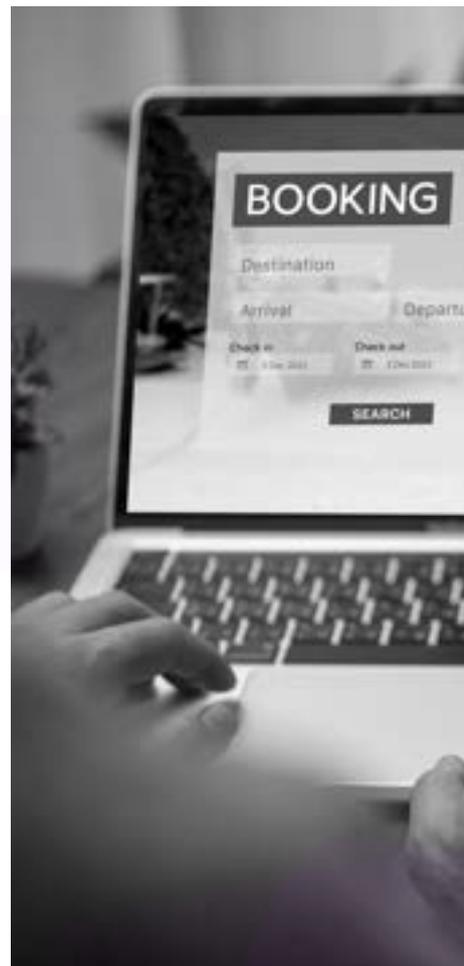
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Traveler Expectations Have Reset — and They Are Non-negotiable

Across both roundtables, one theme surfaced repeatedly:

Today's business traveler expects the same clarity, transparency, and personalization they experience in leisure bookings. They want accurate content, clear inclusions, real-time pricing, and confidence that the rate they are selecting is the right one — no surprises at check-in, no friction around loyalty recognition, and no ambiguity on what's included.

Participants noted that many travelers now begin their hotel shopping on consumer channels because they offer richer content and clearer merchandising. Even when those travelers ultimately book through corporate policy, the inconsistency between systems fuels doubt. This behavior not only creates leakage; it undermines trust in the program itself.



The new operating model must start with the traveler experience. Without consistent, accurate content flowing across channels, even the best-intentioned program will struggle to achieve satisfaction, compliance, or cost control.



Corporate Travel Programs are Under Pressure to Deliver More with Less

Corporate buyers face a different but equally complex challenge. They are responsible for compliance, cost containment, traveler satisfaction, and duty-of-care visibility, but often without the staffing or tools that reflect the complexity of today's environment.

In both London and Denver, buyers described the impossibility of meeting rising expectations without more reliable data. Rate accuracy, cancellation policies, inclusions, and loyalty eligibility all vary depending on the source of content. When these discrepancies surface during a trip, the travel manager becomes the owner of the escalation — even though the root cause lies upstream in fragmented content and systems.

There was consensus that corporate programs are willing to embrace modern approaches — dynamic sourcing, personalized offers, AI-driven optimization — but only if the underlying data is trustworthy, consistent, and in real time.

TMC Operational Complexity Has Become Unsustainable

The TMC perspective was equally clear:

The shift to multi-sourcing has increased traveler choice, but it has also dramatically increased operational burden. Agents and servicing teams are navigating inconsistent rate rules, mismatched content, unpredictable payment flows, and bookings that follow different servicing paths depending on the source.



The strongest sentiment from both roundtables was that TMCs cannot continue absorbing this operational friction. Exceptions, rework, and manual reconciliation consume disproportionate resources and create additional service-level risk. Many TMC leaders emphasized that they are eager to modernize but modernization must reduce complexity, not add to it.

This is where structured, normalized, real-time connectivity becomes the backbone of a different future.

When content and payment flows are standardized, TMCs regain control, reduce operational noise, and unlock the capacity to innovate.

Hotel Partners Need Accuracy, Consistency, and Better Commercial Alignment

Hotel participants voiced a parallel frustration:

Inconsistent representation across channels is eroding their ability to control brand integrity, manage profitability, and grow share in priority segments. Rate parity issues — whether caused by content lag, mapping inconsistencies, or misinterpreted rules — create tension with owners and confusion for travelers.

Equally pressing is the financial dimension. Hotel owners are more focused than ever on cost of sale. They scrutinize distribution costs, payment fees, and the true contribution of negotiated business. When costs are opaque or inconsistent, confidence erodes and program participation becomes harder to justify.

Roundtable participants also emphasized that hotels increasingly view business travel as a critical arena for growing loyalty. They want better visibility into traveler profiles, more consistent loyalty recognition, and the ability to participate in more collaborative commercial programs with TMCs, but legacy systems make this nearly impossible.

Modern connectivity enables a future where hotels can protect their brand, merchandise effectively, and collaborate more deeply with their TMC partners on loyalty, market share, and personalized offers.



Payment Friction and Reconciliation Gaps Remain One of the Most Exhausting Operational Challenges

If content is the most visible pain point, payments are the most exhausting one.

Across both sessions, participants described VCC recognition as unpredictable, inconsistent, and far too dependent on property-level staff who turn over frequently and have limited training. Hotels acknowledged this burden as well — noting that outdated PMS workflows, multi-step authorization rules, and fear of chargebacks all contribute to front-desk hesitation.

This inconsistency has material consequences:

- ! Travelers experience embarrassment and delays.
- ! TMCs absorb the escalation and rework.
- ! Hotels face added labor pressure and financial risk.
- ! Corporates lose visibility into their true cost of stay.
- ! Reconciliation cycles dramatically slow down

Participants were clear: Until payments and reconciliation are streamlined, business travel cannot scale efficiently.

Modern connectivity — paired with automated, structured payment workflows — is the path forward.

The Missing Layer: A Shared Source of Truth

Perhaps the most important insight from both roundtables was this:
No two stakeholders today share the same version of the booking record.

Hotels, TMCs, OBTs, and payment providers all hold pieces of the truth, but not the whole. This fragmentation creates a cascading effect:

Missed Revenue



Attribution Uncertainty

Commission Disputes



Traveler Servicing Failures

A shared, structured, real-time source of truth is the connective tissue the industry does not currently have but urgently needs.

This is the cornerstone of the new operating model.

More accurate merchandising, improved visibility, and better attribution — strengthening participation and loyalty investment.
- ✔ A Foundation for Automation and AI
AI can only operate effectively when the underlying data is structured, timely, and consistent.

Preparing for an AI-enabled Future

AI will reshape business travel, but only if the ecosystems that support it are modernized. Participants in both roundtables highlighted the emerging potential for these capabilities:

- ✓ Intelligent Re-shopping
- ✓ Personalized Recommendations
- ✓ Automated Exception Resolution
- ✓ Dynamic, Context-aware Pricing
- ✓ Last-Minute Targeted Offers
- ✓ Forecasting Across Distribution, Servicing, and Occupancy



But all of these capabilities depend on structured, real-time connectivity, and a unified booking record. AI cannot transform what the underlying infrastructure cannot support.
